



## Family Doctors, Nurse Practitioners, and other Healthcare Providers are working with Primary Care Clinical Pharmacists

### Here's what this means for you:

A Primary Care Clinical Pharmacist (PCCP) uses their special training to ensure your medications are safe, effective, and working for you.

Your PCCP may work in your local clinic or you may see them in another healthcare setting, or virtually.

Your PCCP does not dispense medications; they will work together with the pharmacist and pharmacy where you get your prescriptions.

Your PCCP will take the time to fully understand your health needs and answer your questions - usually 1 hour for the first 1:1 visit and then less time for follow-up visits as needed.

Your PCCP will treat you with dignity and respect, and ensure you receive care in a way that feels safe for you.

### If you want care from a PCCP:

Take the [Medication Risk Assessment Questionnaire](#) to see if you could benefit from this service. Ask your family doctor or nurse practitioner if a PCCP is available in your area.

If yes, ask for a referral to your local PCCP.
